


#### Privilege Acknowledgement

Librarianship has a history of not being progressive or proactive on issues of race, ethnicity, identity, culture, etc.


These problems persist today.

#### The STEM Layer


- Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math have known diversity, equity, and inclusion issues.

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Employed scientists and engineers by ethnicity, and race. United States, 2017




#### Chart 2

#### The Publishing Layer

- Publishing determines which voices and experiences are seen and heard by others.
- It is both an *amplifier* and a **gatekeeper**.



#### **Publishing Demographics**

- Industry is very White, female, straight, and Western.
- 89% of the mainstream fiction books published in 2018 were written by white authors.\*
- Publishing is an old industry and slow to change.

# The Library Layer

#### Obstacles to change


Library workers are overwhelmingly White.

Professional values include:

- "Neutrality"
- "The public good"

... which often means:

- Maintaining the status quo
- Denying problems exist



Race/ethnicity of library staff - <u>Inclusion</u>, <u>Diversity</u>, and <u>Equity</u>: <u>Members of the Association of</u> <u>Research Libraries</u>

#### Why is this so hard?

- Library catalogs focus on the work, not the author.
- Library Subject Classifications were made by and for a White cis male audience. Everyone else is omitted or is awkwardly added on.
- The companies that sell books to libraries do the same and do not support independent presses and self-published books.



#### To label or not label

Labeling materials "for diversity" can lead to:

- Tokenization and othering
- Further marginalization
- Outing and deadnaming
- Labels that are outdated or too granular

Not labeling "for diversity" can lead to:

 Missed buyers, readers, studies, and other opportunities.



"Labeling books by or about BIPOC is to declare them different because of who they are and that they are only interesting because of how they contrast with whiteness. Labeling does not celebrate diversity but instead centers whiteness as the norm and relegates BIPOC-ness to the abnormal, thereby reinforcing white supremacy."

#### Search Techniques to Know

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
- AND, OR, and NOT to combine or reject terms
- Quotation marks for phrases
- Advanced Search can be your friend
- Subject headings (libraries use these, other search tools don't)

  - Request a purchase!

As librarians we are frequently asked "How do I find books by trans scientists?" or "How do I research what it's like to be a black engineer while there is increasing interest in these types of works they remain find, recommend, and purchase. This is frustrating for educators and librarians, but especially for readers who want to see diverse experier cultures reflected in media and education.

The truth is that not all experiences are captured in "literature." Margin populations face barriers - in education, in careers, in publishing - limi number of formal accounts of their lives in "academic media". Songs, blogs, documentaries, self-published memoirs, etc. are all valid forms personal expression and experience, so why are they not valued and in STEM? In this session, we'll discuss systemic participation and incl barriers marginalized groups face and ways we can fight this pattern iclassroom, the library, and beyond.

This presentation will be of value to educators hoping to diversify and "reading" lists and students researching these topics.
