Authors Frank Hernandez, Jonathon McPhetres, and Joann M. Marshall analyze what we can learn from graduate students who are training to be school leaders in K-12 schools.

Finally, this issue has a helpful book review on *Just Queer Folks: Gender and Sexuality in Rural America* by Colin R. Johnson.

One thing that each of these authors has in common is their willingness to speak up and address these important issues. We cannot be silent when there are injustices facing so many. As Malala Yousafzai, Nobel Peace Prize winner, said in a speech at Harvard University in September 2013: "When the whole world is silent, even one voice becomes powerful."
